Remembering The Hub

All around us are subtle clues that tell us things about our town's history. We pass by them almost every day, usually without much notice. Take a look under the green awning at 123 North Main Street. Hidden underneath you will find evidence of a shop that closed over thirty years ago: The Hub.

The Hub, a combination soda shop and notions store, was opened in October 1962 by local businessman Ralph Quackenbush. The business was designed to fill the void that was left when Hugo Sapp's College

Cut-Rate Pharmacy closed in the same location about a year prior after serving the students and townspeople for more than two decades. In addition to soda fountain fare, The Hub offered magazines, LP records, school supplies, paperback books and other items that were not available at the college union at the time. Not long after opening, The Hub also became a Greyhound bus terminal, where customers could buy tickets and cargo could be handled and stored.

The Hub was a popular haunt for both the college students and the youth in town. At the request of the students, it was open until 2 am to provide them with a late night destination. It was also the only place in town with a grill. One specialty item available was the "Triple R" burger, which stood for "Ralph's Raunchy Repast." Named by a college student (possibly the student who first requested

it), the "Triple R" consisted of two hamburgers on toast with relish, mustard, ketchup and onions. Local kids would come to The Hub not only to enjoy something delicious from the grill, but to hopefully find one of Davidson's first-team All-American basketball players — like Fred Hetzel, Dick Snyder, or Mike Maloy (also Davidson's first black basketball player) — hanging around.

Sunday, September 21, 2008 Tour of Currie & Stough Houses 559 & 612 N. Main St

This program is a real treat for Davidson residents new and old! The Currie home was built in 1911 by Dr. Archibald Currie, a Davidson College professor who taught for over 41 years while also pursuing a career as an active attorney. His wife, Lucy Martin Currie ("Miss Lucy") was the sister of Davidson College president W. J. Martin.

Also open for viewing is the Stough House, 612 N. Main Street, owned by Dave and Sherry Malushizky. This home was originally built for Professor and Mrs. Lewis Schenk in 1930 by Will Potts, builder of many Davidson homes. S. T. Stough, local businessman and postmaster, and his family occupied the home for many years.

For more than 200 years, the Mecklenburg Declaration of Independence (aka Meck Dec) has caused a stir. Its signing date, May 20, 1775, is on the NC state flag. Meck Dec celebrations have brought four presidents, a first lady, and a decorated general to Charlotte. However, no original copies of this document have ever been found, leading some to question whether it ever existed.


Jane Johnson, Carolina Room librarian at the Charlotte-Mecklenburg public library, will discuss the history and controversy behind this celebrated document.

The Hub was the first food establishment in town to serve all patrons equally, regardless of race. According to a 1963 Davidsonian article, The Hub was one of only four local facilities that had opened their doors to all local citizens and

students without regard to race. The other facilities were the town library and the restrooms at both Cliff Archer's Gulf station and Bill Gurley's Esso station.

The Hub closed in 1976. As Ralph Quackenbush recalls, it just seemed to be a good time to close. Ralph had become more interested in furniture restoration, a business that would allow him to cut back on his working hours. There was also a little more competition in town - the College Union now offered more retail services to students and Lefty Driesell's Wildcat Den had opened next door several years earlier.

same location. A few years later, Ralph moved The Workbench to Cornelius when Tom Clark, who had purchased the building from Louise Sloan around 1974, decided to use the space for his own business.





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A Note from the President...


We are very excited about the coming DHS year! We have some wonderful programs planned - we hope you will join us. See page 2 for the dates and details.
